A hotel manager or a customer-service representative who speaks English and another language may look much better at promotion time than one who speaks only English.

Frequently Asked Questions:

How many years of a language do I need for college? Most colleges want applicants to have at least 3 years of the same world language. However, it is advantageous to get to the highest level possible.

Are there language requirements for a scholar's diploma? You need 2 years of a world language for a scholar's diploma.

What is a weighted course? Honors courses are weighted .25 and AP courses are weighted 1.0.
