


Days 8-9: Reading

Read and Respond: Complete comprehension activities

<u>Task 1</u>: Revisit the text, *An Octopus is Amazing*. Using your Anticipatory Guide sheet, reread each statement and decide if it is true or false. Circle the answer in the "after" column.

<u>Task 2</u>: Watch a Brainpop video about main idea/supporting details.

<u>Task 3:</u> Use the handouts titled **Main Idea and Supporting Details** in the packet for *An Octopus is Amazing*. You will reread parts of the text to find the supporting details for each main idea. (The page numbers are on the handout.) You will only need to complete two of the pages since I will show an example below for the main idea Predators and Defense.

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Example

Main Idea: Predators and Defense

Supporting Details: Supporting details are ways that the octopus protects itself from predators and defends itself.

- 1) The octopus changes color to camouflage itself from enemies.
- 2) The octopus can squirt an ink-black liquid to form a blob that has the same shape and smell of an octopus.
- 3) An octopus hides from enemies.

Now you will do the same activity with the following Main Ideas:

- <u>An Octopus Can Change Color</u> (What are the different reasons an octopus changes color? What do the colors tell us?)
- Hunting for Food (How does the octopus hunt for food? How does the octopus' body help it catch and eat food?)

Days 10-11: Reading

<u>Read and Respond:</u> Revisit *An Octopus is Amazing* to create your own Table of Contents for the text.

<u>Example</u>: The handout shows Chapter 1 on page 158. First, review page 158 to determine the main idea. What are most of the details telling about? It is about the different kinds of octopuses so the title of the chapter could be <u>Types of Octopuses</u>. Write the title on the line next to Chapter 1.



Sometimes you will need to look over a few pages to determine what the text is mostly about for that "chapter." For example, Chapter 4 is pages 162 and 163, notice that page 162 is about how an octopus changes color to hide and page 163 is about how an octopus changes color to show feelings. The best way to summarize both of these pages with a main idea would be <u>An Octopus Changes Color.</u>


Days 10-11: Writing
