

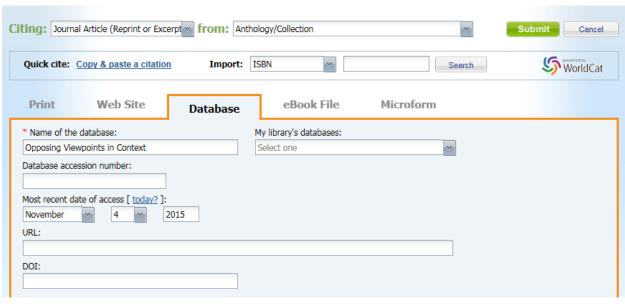


This article was published in the anthology *Is Selling Body Parts Ethical?* The anthology is a print book in the "At Issue" series. (Books in this series contain a collection of essays taken from various sources.) From the clues in the sample citation at the end of the article ("Rpt. from"), we can guess that the article in the book was originally published in another source in 2009 under another title, "Advancing Organ Donation ..." We'll have to guess that the article was originally published in a journal since no publication information is given.

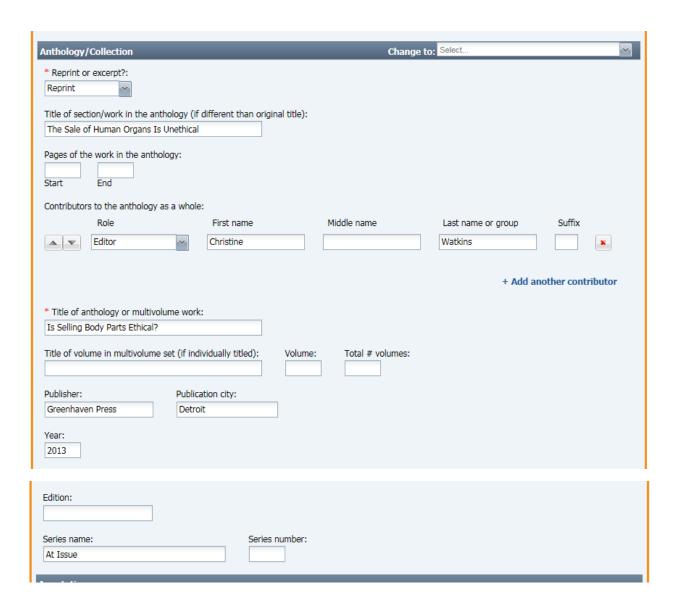
Cite it in NoodleTools as a journal article reprinted in an anthology and found in a database:

1. Start with "Database"

- 2. Choose "Anthology"
- 3. Change to "Journal Article (Reprint or Excerpt)" in box at top left
- 4. Fill in the blanks as shown below. NoodleTools requires something to be entered in the journal name box, but it can be deleted later by editing the Works Cited document.
