Sarah Bower	Doylestown Township Region 8	I would like the board members to be aware of the the American Academy of Pediatrics say in regarding social distancing in the classroom: "There is a conflict between optimal academic and social/emotional learning in schools and strict adherence to current physical distancing guidelines. For example, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) recommends that schools "space seating/desks at least 6 feet apart when feasible." In many school settings, 6 feet between students is not feasible without limiting the number of students. Evidence suggests that spacing as close as 3 feet may approach the benefits of 6 feet of space, particularly if students are wearing face coverings and are asymptomatic." Kindergarten should not be online learning. They need to be in the classroom for more than 5 hours/week. Last spring when Kindergarten was distance learning less that half of the children were participating.

		The very first bullet point is enough argument that going back will not necessarily improve mental health.
		As a person who's career is in children's mental health for the past 20+ years, I strongly disagree with the arguments that "schools should reopen for children's emotional health". No version of this situation is good for children's mental well-being, so we are choosing between bad situations here. Calls to open up schools are shorted sighted and illogical. Here are some things bad for emotional health about reopening:
		- Children experiencing so much more death of their loved ones, friend's loved ones, and community members.
		- Having to obey rigid and developmentally inappropriate behavioral expectations to maintain social distancing for hours at a time.
		- Restricting their engagement with their peers even though those peers are right in front of them.
		- Having to constantly actively participate in cleaning rituals that keep their community trauma present with them
		- Somehow having to have the executive functioning within all of this to meet educational standards and possibly experiencing overwhelm, shame, and self-doubt when they reasonably can't
		- Being unable to receive age appropriate comfort from teachers and staff when dysregulated from all of this, thereby experiencing attachment injuries daily.
		- Lack of any predictability as COVID takes staff members for weeks at a time with no warning while children wonder if that staff will die as well as the looming threat of going to back into quarantine any random day
		Returning to school as things are now is NOT better for children's mental health.
		It is a complete rationalization by people who are uncomfortable with children not engaging in productivity culture.
		The majority of schooling NEEDS to stay virtual to protect our children and teachers and to make room for the safe return of the populations of students who actually do need to be in person.

Debbie Cicchiello	Warrington	As the parent of a senior at CB South, I am grateful for the administration and Board putting safety of students and staff first when trying to plan for this near impossible situation. I know there is nothing students, parents, and staff want more than for everything to go back to normal, but that is just not possible in the midst of a global pandemic that we do not have under control in our country. With testing typically lagging by more than a week, it will be very difficult to contact trace and control spread of covid in schools.
		While nothing is risk free, decisions should be made to mitigate as much risk as possible for students AND all staff who work with our students, including bus drivers. Wearing masks and having six feet of social distancing are both scientific ways of decreasing risk. The hybrid model allows for fewer students on buses, in hallways, and in classrooms, decreasing the chance of spread when mask wearing is enforced.
		As the school year gets under way, I also ask administration and the board to be flexible and adjust the plan as needed based on local Covid numbers as well as scientific data about the virus as well as school population impact on spread of disease.

I am also pleased that you are following the directives of our health professionals and you are following decades-old legal guidance with respect to students with disabilities; your plan ensures that students with disabilities will have the best chance to have their educational needs met. I am hopeful that on the three days the students will be online, the teaching and guidance will be more robust and fruitful, and that the district will provide more substantial, content-rich online platforms to help teachers and students.
		I implore the school directors to organize families for their assigned two-day in-person learning based upon their neighborhood -- not by alphabetical order. Given the wide geographical range of students at the middle and high schools, dividing students by alphabet may make it much harder for students to avoid the most dangerous part of the plan, which is riding on the school bus in an enclosed space, as the bus driver cannot supervise student behavior while driving. Allowing all students from the same neighborhood/development to attend at the same time will allow families to organize themselves in safer "pods" and provide logistical support to each other, while giving them the option to carpool in the safest way. If a parent wishes to have their child avoid the school bus, but cannot drive them to school due to work responsibilities, the whole plan could be undermined.
		On behalf of my family, thank you to the directors, administration, teachers and staff for all you have done, and all you will continue to do, to prepare for our students' arrival on August 31.

		I would like to thank everyone for their diligence in considering options for the 2020-2021 school year during the COVID-19 pandemic. I appreciate the difficulty and challenge of trying to follow the ever evolving guidance, work within a restricted budget, and find a suitable solution across the diversity of the school district.
		I have read through the proposal and appreciate the challenge associated with the revised recommendations and procedures that were released from the governor and the Pennsylvania Department of Education that is inclusive of the CDC recommendation for 6 foot spacing coupled with the fear that not following such guidance may result in a penalty and/or loss of state funding.
		I do fear that this guideline is not aligned with the most recent science. In a study published in Pediatrics, the researchers analyzed data from all COVID-19 patients younger than 16 years who were identified between March 10, 2020, and April 10, 2020, through a hospital surveillance network. Parents and household contacts were called for contact tracing.
		As summarized in this medscape article ( <a href="https://www.medscape.com/viewarticle/933744">https://www.medscape.com/viewarticle/933744</a> ), The data in the current study support other studies of transmission among household contacts in China suggesting that, in most cases of childhood infections, "the child was not the source of infection and that children most frequently acquire COVID-19 from adults, rather than transmitting it to them," they wrote.
		In addition, the limited data on transmission of SARS-CoV-2 by children outside of the household show few cases of secondary infection from children identified with SARS-CoV-2 in school settings in studies from France and Australia, Dr. Lee and Dr. Raszka noted.

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		"On the basis of these data, SARS-CoV2 transmission in schools may be less important in community transmission than initially feared," the editorialists wrote. "This would be another manner by which SARS-CoV2 differs drastically from influenza, for which school-based transmission is well recognized as a significant driver of epidemic disease and forms the basis for most evidence regarding school closures as public health strategy."
		They go on to conclude: "Therefore, serious consideration should be paid toward strategies that allow schools to remain open, even during periods of COVID-19 spread," the editorialists concluded. "In doing so, we could minimize the potentially profound adverse social, developmental, and health costs that our children will continue to suffer until an effective treatment or vaccine can be developed and distributed or, failing that, until we reach herd immunity," Dr. Lee and Dr. Raszka emphasized.
		As a mother of two younger children where both myself and my husband work, I am finding it hard to imagine how we will get through the academic year under the current recommendation and feel strongly that alternates should be considered for lower grade level students given the mounting evidence supporting that transmission rate among children under 16 is low.
		Furthermore, I looked at the responses for childcare concern and saw that 56% of respondents stated that childcare would not be an issue. What I would like to understand the response to this question by grade level to understand if there is a segment of the school population where childcare constraints may be of greater concern, and, if yes, could this be addressed.
		With the increasing evidence of lower transmission rate in children, I implore you to consider alternate guidelines for lower grade students; either K-6 or K-3, and to consider a less than 6 foot required spacing.
		This alternate option provides the most face-to-face instruction and in-school experience for students who most benefit and require the most assistance for distance learning, thus reducing the parental burden and associated family stress.
		I thank you for consideration of this alternate model.

Keep in mind these are public school districts that have the same challenges and size constraints as CBSD. Currently both my wife and I have jobs that require us to be out of the home on a daily basis - my wife in particular is in healthcare and on the front lines of this pandemic at YOUR local hospital. The decisions made on Friday has forced us to look for schools outside of CBSD and require additional costs outside of what we already pay to the township. If we look back at last week where three options were presented (virtual, hybrid and in-person) to now where we only have two, it seems to be that there was NO consideration for dual working parents. Would you be able to offer your opinion on the best option to handle this situation with my family and what assistance will be provided by CBSD since we have no other option but to look to private schools for both of my children this upcoming year?

		As both a parent and teacher in this district I have concerns that pertain to both roles.
		I am a Speech Pathologist entering my 21st year in CB. I am a staff member in the medically high-risk group. I work with students in small groups, across grade-levels and classrooms, K-6 every day of the week. I work in close proximity to ALL students. In teaching kids to communicate, articulate, and learn language, that is achieved by students seeing my mouth, me seeing their mouth, modeling and prompting verbally, and providing close proximity for the safety of those students who have eloping behaviors. None of those things can be achieved under the new guidelines with in-person instruction. I believe my job is best done virtually at this time. I will not meet the needs of my students from 6 feet away with a mask on. As a small subset of special education, the unique parameters of the Speech Therapists' jobs are often not considered. I am asking that you consider that our job is best done virtually right now.
		My elementary building is unairconditioned. The only way I can keep my room's temperature from rising above 90 degrees during the warm months is to keep the windows closed and the door shut. This obviously poses a risk for ventilation but how can students and staff wear a mask for 7 hours safely in that kind of heat? I ask you, when was the last time you tried to work for 7 hours straight without air conditioning? Now I ask, when did you try to do it with a mask on?

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		I personally am concerned about my health. I am able to work but need consideration as a Lymphoma Cancer Survivor. I am asking that the district take staff health into account and allow individuals to continue to work safely for their health.

She is a perfectionist and as a result carries the anxiety associated with high performing individuals. This anxiety is only heightened with the lack of being able to properly prepare for colleges (No ACT/SAT, AP classes went to Pass Fail and will not go toward their overall GPA, No college visits, revised AP tests in their home, some with only one question to define their knowledge). These kids have only a few months to complete their preparation for the rest of the college education but cannot do this due to the situation.
		The on-line structure of the classes this past year was the best you could do in short notice but was NOT adequate for on-going learning. It did not give them motivation to perform to their abilities.
		Also wearing a mask, restricting oxygen, harboring pathogens in the mask does not help with the already growing anxiety these kids are feeling. Junior year and beginning of Senior year has always been the hardest and the most pressure, then this pandemic added a whole new level.
		They need to be in class and in person if at all possible. The need that structure and learning environment. They are at a very low risk for contracting COVID and should not be required to wear masks during classroom instruction or during tests. We need to concentrate on sanitization, hand washing, washing surfaces and ensuring kids stay home if not feeling well, and NOT wearing a mask which is restrictive to their breathing and ultimately their learning. If the masks work so well, then this virus would have never made it out of China whom always have worn masks.

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		I am a microbiologist by trade and have yet to ready any scientific data that suggests that the homemade or even the surgical masks prevent the spread of this virus, especially knowing that most are not washing the masks or discarding after every use. According to Dr. Damsker, Bucks County is at the "baseline" they were aiming for with an average of 20 - 25 new coronavirus cases/day and he believes that we are likely to remain at this level for the next year. Are we supposed to wait a year or two before our children can return to in-person, 5 day/week school? I believe that would do irreparable harm to our children in so many ways.
		Distance Learning was an epic fail despite the best efforts of our wonderful Central Bucks teachers. My daughter has lost so much ground academically that it will take a lot of work to bring her back to where she was in March. In addition, I saw, as many of us did, my 10 year old in agony because she missed her teachers and classmates. There were so many tears. 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		Having a hybrid approach is a very poor solution that was offered up at 6PM on Friday night by the Superintendent. The board members now have to take a vote on something they weren't given ample time to dissect. Dr. Kopicki simply took Governor Wolf's school reopening "recommendations and guidelines" word-for-word and I quote, "The Governor's new guidance says 6 foot spacing to the maximum extent feasible", which is simply not feasible at ANY school. If you look at neighboring school's plans, they are all going back five days a week in-person. This list includes, but is not limited to, Boyertown, New Hope/Solebury, Methacton, North Penn, Wissahickon, Pennridge, Quakertown, and Hatboro-Horsham.
		I pay very high school taxes to a school district that is, supposedly, one of the top districts in the state. This will undoubtedly change our beloved Central Bucks' top-tier status for years to come. Putting Governor Wolf's ulterior political agenda in front of education is simply not right for the students, the parents, or the teachers and faculty. I have seen clearly the negative toll of taking my two elementary-aged children out of school. Their cognitive abilities, reading, arithmetic, anxiety levels, and social development have gone so far in reverse that I am fearful this will impact them for the rest of their lives. They cry themselves to sleep most nights now (this NEVER happened before), wondering when their lives will return to some semblance of normalcy.
		Has the Teacher's Union weighed out the likelihood that many teachers will, no doubt, be laid off or furloughed due to this decision? Also, for the 88% of parents who responded to the survey last month stating that they wanted to send their kids back in the Fall five days/week, was this just completely ignored in Dr. Kopicki's decision? Let's now think about all of the children who have two working parents. Many of these parents will, without a doubt, be forced to quit their job due to this decision, eventually forcing them to move to a school district that they can afford to live in due to loss of income.
		All this for a virus that infects 0.004% of children and has virtually a 0% death rate. According to the CDC, there's a positive test rate of 4 cases per 100,000 children ages 5-17 in the United States. Sadly, 30 children under the age of 18 have passed while infected with Covid. There are 74 million kids under 18 in the US. Children (and most adults) have a much higher chance of dying in an car accident on their way to school (~116,000 children die in an automobile accident annually). 18.5% of children are obese, which puts them at a much greater risk of a lifetime of health problems.
		Child-to-adult transmission also appears to be VERY uncommon, according to studies done on France, China, and Wales. Teachers who are immuno-compromised or are afraid to return to an "essential job" should be aloud to teach the online instruction for those parents who choose this option for their children. 		The online learning is completely ineffective. My daughter is a rising senior at East and she said she learned "absolutely nothing" during the spring online learning session. I ask that the board members as well as the superintendent consider changing school to an online only option until at least January. At which point, health concerns can be noted and reevaluated and students can be sent to school if the risk is lowered or kept home if the risk is the same or heightened. This would keep us safer and help flatten the curve from Covid-19 during the sickness-riddled fall and winter. if you make this decision now this will give teachers enough time with administrative support to adequately plan for rigorous and appropriate online instruction that contains both some synchronous and some asynchronous teaching. As you have already acknowledged, being that there is a hybrid option and not a fully in school option, it is impossible to keep kids at least 6 ft apart, and even with a lower amount of children in the building it will still be difficult if not impossible to have them keep their masks on all day and practice appropriate hand washing. Being that anyone can claim an exemption for not wearing a mask this puts students who are wearing a mask in a vulnerable position, and may serve to further confuse and isolate those who are not wearing a mask because their parents told them they don't need to. Last spring we were all thrown into crisis mode and the district did a wonderful job through virtual learning. this year we have the opportunity to make the decision earlier and really plan out to give our students a more similar education to what would be in school, just over the computer. It can be wonderful, it can be effective, and you can still get students to bond and feel a sense of camaraderie virtually if planned ahead of time. I can tell you as a teacher, I recently had to clear my elementary classroom of all personal belongings and almost all of my furniture besides a teacher desk, students desks, and a few tables to hold supplies. It is stark, it is barren, it is not welcoming in the least, and the lessons and I will teach my students could be delivered virtually with more empathy, emotion, and manipulatives than can be done in this face-to-face learning situation.

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		this needs to be communicated sooner rather than later not only to parents but to teachers as from my understanding they have not gotten much communication about these various plans ahead of time and that is not fair to them as employees and individuals. The most recent science we have ( <a href="https://www.medscape.com/viewarticle/933744">https://www.medscape.com/viewarticle/933744</a> ) is that transmission for the very young (below 10) is very low. In the article, I quote "the child was not the source of infection and that children most frequently acquire COVID-19 from adults, rather than transmitting it to them," they wrote. In addition, the limited data on transmission of SARS-CoV-2 by children outside of the household show few cases of secondary infection from children identified with SARS-CoV-2 in school settings in studies from France and Australia, Dr. Lee and Dr. Raszka noted in the paper.

In the past few days, I have learned that CBSD prioritizes politics over students, science, and statistics. I am asking you to review the actual facts, including the district's own poll, and to please help give children back their normal school week of five days. Please assist me in not letting any of this further rob children of their education.
		I have watched the district go from following the reasonable, SCIENCE-based advice from Dr. Damsker, to cowering in the corner under suggestions from politicians who are neither medical professionals nor educators. These adults could facilitate learning and answer questions as needed. Students in schools would not have any advantage over students at home as they are not being taught, only being assisted to meet their individual needs. Classes would be populated as they always have been, so if we are all able to come back, we are on the same playing field so to speak.

Brian Warfield	Doylestown	Given the latest reports from Harvard Health ( <a href="https://www.health.harvard.edu/diseases-and-conditions/coronavirus-resource-center">https://www.health.harvard.edu/diseases-and-conditions/coronavirus-resource-center</a> ) and the CDC ( <a href="https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/faq.html">https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/faq.html</a> ), we know that the main way COVID-19 is spread is through respiratory droplets and "smaller, infectious particles" that "can drift around in the air for several hours." These particles are highly infectious, making spread hard to control indoors. These droplets can be emitted from an infected person, who may have few symptoms, by simply talking or breathing.
		It's troubling to read that elementary classes may be held traditionally during a time when we know very little about the long-term health effects of the virus for both children and adults. To drive this point home, studies are currently underway to research the "possibility of testicular damage and subsequent infertility following COVID-19 infection" due to "binding of SARS-COV2 virus to ACE2 receptors or secondary to immunological and inflammatory response" (Abobaker & Raba 2020). Of course, "[f]ollow-up studies of [the] reproductive function of recovered male patients" are needed before we can be sure, and studies like these have the potential to take years of work while we forge ahead somewhat blindly (Abobaker & Raba 2020).
		Allowing full classes of elementary students (and their adult caretakers) to remove face coverings indoors to eat, drink, talk, and most importantly, inhale whatever droplets or particles may exist from these activities is not a safe-enough or acceptable practice. A further concern is the recommendation to allow specialist teachers (art, music, etc.) to visit ALL of these classrooms, exposing them to hundreds of children's and many adults' particles each day. The potential for super-spreading by and infection in these teachers is far too high.
		That said, there are solutions. A hybrid option at the elementary level allows for creative use of spaces to allow smaller groups to eat and take mask breaks outdoors while supervised. A hybrid option allows teachers to concentrate on and monitor the safety of a smaller group of children and adults (many classrooms have several adult assistants) during the day. A hybrid option allows for easier contact tracing and less disruption to a larger group if a student or teacher becomes ill. Finally, other districts have found ways to keep specialist teachers teaching outdoors or virtually to avoid the hundreds of exposures they will encounter each day.

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		I'm hopeful that Dr. Kopicki's letter on July 17th is more representative of how the district plans to protect our students, teachers, school staff, and district families than the Health and Safety Plan that was released yesterday. I find that the recent words of Superintendent Grant Rivera, of Marietta City Schools, really resonate: "My moral obligation and my moral responsibility is to acknowledge that we could be putting some people at risk....I'm not going to make a decision that I feel could potentially have someone lose a life because we prioritized an academic need over a staff or a student's long-term safety...Nobody dies at school, and nobody dies from school."

I am the proud mother of two sets of twins, all who are students in this district. Chase is a senior at CB East's student in the self-contained Low Incidence Autistic Support class, his twin Cole is a senior at CB West and our younger twin boys who are 8th graders at Lenape Middle School. Waving them all off on that first day of school (while enjoy probably the most amazingly quiet cup of coffee since mid-March) under the assumption all is normal, is not a possibility. I know that is not what is best for my family based on facts and research. Like many, my head was a complete swirl when the options for educational choices were presented. This kind of decision is overwhelming but am very thankful for options that were made to keep our children and the faculty and staff at CBSD safe. Like with any decision, I knew and assumed that not all would be happy, with the options provided. As always, that assumption was proven correct with the uproars and disrespect displayed on social media. From parents requesting names of docs who give fake notes for mask excuses, to blatant bashing of administrators and board members. Expected. However, was disheartened at the remarks made by Leigh Vlasblom in an email that has been circulating on social media mom. I would like to make specific comments and concerns on what I read:

Will having students in class 5 days a week in all elementary schools allow for the safety precautions that we would benefit from in the hybrid model, e.g. 6 feet of separation?
		Will parents be provided specifics regarding each option before we are asked to choose? Some details that are material to our family's decisioning are: safety measures for traditional vs. hybrid (actual number of feet between desks), whether CBSD teachers or a 3rd party will be providing instruction, whether the curriculum is CBSD or 3rd party for all options, the re-entry plan for hybrid and 100% virtual (i.e., will teacher and curriculum be maintained despite re-entry?), and the exit plan for the traditional and hybrid options (i.e., will teacher and curriculum be maintained despite exit?).

		Thank you for all of your efforts to navigate this complex and unprecedented pandemic world on behalf of our students.
		I recognize how extraordinarily challenging school re-opening planning is for you all.
		Despite all of the challenges that distance learning has posed, it appears that one of the unexpected benefits of distance learning may have been that the majority of teens seem to have met their biologically required sleep needs.
		According to some survey data just collected and analyzed by the locally based Regional Adolescent Sleep Needs Coalition, the generally later start times of live instruction and office hours during distance learning have better aligned with biologically driven adolescent sleep-wake cycles, likely providing students with more nightly sleep and being better rested. These outcomes are the objectives of policy recommendations from numerous national medical organizations that urge secondary schools to begin at 8:30AM or later in the interest of student health and wellbeing.
		Key findings from this new survey include:
		• 82% of schools reported in the survey are starting live instruction and/or office hours at 8:30 AM or later
		• 86% of students observed in the survey are getting 8 hours or more of sleep on school days
		• Average sleep for teens on school nights was 8.87 hours compared to pre-stay at home national averages* where 73% of teens get 7 hours or less per school night. (Wheaton et al. 2018)
		• 81% of parents reported that their children were more rested during stay-at-home orders compared to normal
		These survey findings are likely associated with the later school start times established during distance learning.
		As you finalize your plans for fall, we know you are aware of student mental health challenges that have been exacerbated by the pandemic. We also imagine you are mindful of student physical health, including their immune systems. Abundant research shows that sufficient sleep has a profoundly beneficial effect on both mental and physical health.
		We urge you to consider the data we've just provided and to continue to plan instructional schedules with these findings and existing research in mind. You might also consider asking that assignments be due no later than 10PM to encourage earlier bedtimes and reduce screen time before bed.
		Whether you will be providing in person learning, distance learning, or both, supporting optimum student sleep health should be a priority. Thank you.

		My name is Jill Talarico. I am a CB teacher and resident and am writing on my own behalf to ask that the board members and administration address the following questions and concerns at tonight's meeting:
		1. Can you please explain the factors that resulted in adding the third option to the Health and Safety Plan? Last Friday, the district stated that only two options would be offered in the fall: hybrid and online. The plan up for approval this evening includes a third option of full-time, in-person instruction for elementary only. From an elementary teacher's perspective, this sends a message that our health and wellbeing is less important than others in our district, and I cannot help but wonder if this option was added to provide childcare for parents with young children.
		2. Can administration please improve communication and transparency with the staff? I understand that information and guidelines change daily; however, important information regarding our district's plan has been broadcasted on the news and published online prior to being shared with staff.
		3. Will staff be given additional time to prepare for the upcoming school year? If teachers are required to deliver both in-person and online instruction, we will need significantly more time to plan and prepare. Elementary teachers have yet to be trained in Canvas and developing and modifying content on Canvas is a time-consuming process. On top of Canvas training and preparation, we will need to learn how to use the live streaming technology, clean out our classrooms from the last school year, and reconfigure our space for the upcoming school year. All of this cannot be accomplished in the three days prior to the beginning of the school year, and the school year starts in less than six weeks. Please consider revising the calendar to place all staff development days at the beginning of the school year.
		4. If staff members contract Covid-19 at work, how will the district support them if they suffer from long-term effects? Studies have found that Covid-19 can permanently damage the lungs, heart, and brain.
		5. How will the district handle the shortage of substitutes? The inability to fill all substitute vacancies has been a problem in the past few years and will likely be even worse this year.
		6. Can you please consider holding the next board meeting in person and/or live streaming the meeting? The meeting could be held in a large auditorium, and attendance could be limited to individuals who are delivering public comment. Registration could be held prior to the meeting. Also, please note the hypocrisy of holding a remote meeting as a safety precaution, while simultaneously planning to send children and staff back to the classroom.
		I am looking forward to listening to the meeting this evening. Thank you for your time.

I understood from initial communications from Dr. Kopicki that safety of our entire school community (students, parents, teachers, staff) was to be "First & foremost"! I fail to see how a 5 day option is in the best interest of our amazing teachers & staff. Thank you for your consideration and hard work!

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		Truthfully, all options are less than ideal given the fluidity of the information about the virus and how it spreads and effects children and adults.
		That being said, I am disappointed in the lack of transparency regarding the addition of a third option following an email sent out by Kopicki outlining we would have two options for the fall. Thus third option (traditional 5 day) was seemingly slipped in the day before the board meeting. These types of things do not inspire confidence in how future issues will be communicated to the community at large.

		2. Why can't secondary students eat lunch? If it is constraints with cafeterias, why could they not eat their lunches in their Advisory classrooms? If you give kids Grab and Go lunches at dismissal aren't you essentially encouraging them to eat on the school buses?
		3. Plan says "limited restroom use" and "Restroom use between <del>5:15</del> periods will be discouraged"; Will secondary teachers be good about allowing students to leave class to use the restroom? They have not been in the past. Limiting restroom use can lead to medical issues such as urinary tract infections. It can also discourage students from drinking enough water to prevent dehydration.
		4. "Locker room use prohibited for PE classes"; So HS students will not change clothes for PE? Will activities be adjusted so that if my student has PE first block that he does not have to walk around school with sweaty clothes on all day?
		5. Page 36 "all field trips and large inter-group activities will be placed on hold and alternative virtual experiences will be explored" - When it says inter-group activities does this include school clubs and after school activities? Will there be in-person after school clubs and activities?
		6. Please clarify when a student would be allowed to return after demonstrating COVID symptoms/testing positive. In different places in the document is says - doctors note, testing negative, and 7 days from symptoms.
		7. Page 49 - Heading says "Use of face coverings (masks or face shields) by older students (as appropriate)" ; Will younger children not be required to wear face masks/ face shields (assuming the state of PA relaxes the state rules)?



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		8. "Individuals who cannot wear a mask due to a medical condition, including those with respiratory issues that impede breathing, mental health condition, or disability and also where the ability to see the mouth is essential for communication will be excluded from this requirement." Will students who want an exemption be required to request one and be approved, or can they just show up without a face mask? Would there potentially be students in classrooms that do not have any face coverings on at all?
		9. Will all MS and HS classes be offered both in the hybrid and online options?
		10. What is the plan with the hybrid model for teaching the online portion of the class? Will the students at home watch the in-school class in real time, or will it be asynchronous? Will the in-classroom and online teacher for hybrid be one teacher, or different teachers?
		11. It has been said that the fully online option for secondary will include outsourced course content. Which vendor? How will CB teachers interface with this course content and with students? If online courses are based on an outsourced product that would not match up directly with the regular CB class content and pacing, does that mean that movement from hybrid to online and vice versa would not be allowed during the year? If online is using outsourced materials, will all MS and HS classes be offered? Will fully online offer Honors and AP courses? When will schedules be sent out? Will students be able to switch classes if they select online only and classes do not map well to the online content provider's offerings?
Nicole Cogan	Warrington	If you open the elementary schools to traditional learning you also need to open the middle and high schools to traditional learning.
Danielle Savin	NBT	It is detrimental for kids to get back into the classroom full time or at least have the option. This doesn't mean I don't want safety measures taken. I do. We need to take into consideration the negative effects of children not being in school full time.
Jessica Forsell	Doylestown Township	Thank you for advancing a 5-day option, with robust safety protocols, for elementary students. Early elementary kids are at a critical point in their education, yet are not effective independent or distance learners, despite everyone's best efforts (including our wonderful Linden teachers). Please also consider treating kids on 504s similarly to those on IEPs, as the level of extra support required can be quite high and difficult for parents to replicate. In the recommendation, I was encouraged to see the idea of leveraging schools' surrounding outdoor spaces for learning in the fall months. I hope this is actively and creatively pursued, since it could have benefits for both physical and mental health.
		The pandemic, and our understanding of the virus, is still evolving. Based on our low levels of community spread in Bucks, unlike other parts of the country, we are fortunate to have the opportunity to begin the schoolyear with the option of in-person instruction. However, it is also imperative to have plans in place to pivot quickly and transition if the situation changes to ensure safety and continuity in education.
		Regarding the survey data, it appears that there is a group that strongly prefers online (a critical option for families with higher-risk profiles) and another group that is opposed to mask-wearing etc (primarily a debate on effectiveness data). However, what is most striking about the survey is that by far the prevailing preference in the community was for in-person options with multiple aggressive measures in place to combat spread of the virus (including face shields/masks at times). This general sentiment can easily become obscured by "louder" voices.
		Finally, in considering the needs of working parents, not every family has the ability to work from home or flexibility to homeschool young children. While some have the privilege of bridging the gap with in-home tutoring support, this is out-of-reach for other families in our community. We should consider the downstream impact of policy decisions on widening the gap between the "haves" and the "have-nots". Our approach needs to be a holistic effort protecting physical and mental health, as well as recognizing educational disparities that could have longer-term societal and economic impact.
		We appreciate that you are working under enormous pressure on a complex, important, and emotionally-charged issue for our community, and thank you for your efforts.

Julia Ott	Warrington	I am hoping the Board will consider a hybrid option for all grade levels and not consider the traditional, full in-person model until later in the school year.
		The science is indicating masks and distancing are the best methods of mitigating the spread of COVID, along with stringent hand washing/sanitizing. Yet this plan is compromising the distance requirements at the elementary level. The plan also says if necessary, elementary children will eat in the classroom, yet the classroom will have less distance than you are proposing in the cafeteria. Three feet between desks with masks in the Green phase may be better than not being distanced at all, but once masks are removed, it should be six feet. That is not possible when eating in the classroom. How are they going to do their gym special in a classroom that will in theory only have adequate space in the Yellow phase? How will there be enough space to do six feet in between desks if we are moved into the Yellow phase without decreasing the amount of students? "When feasible" certainly does not seem to guarantee much will be enforceable in order to provide safety to our teachers and children.
		There is also no explanation of how exemptions to masks will be treated. I understand there will need to be exceptions. What happens if we find non-mask wearing children outnumber those who do, especially if only three feet apart?
		Yes, in-person instruction is critical for elementary; it is also critical for all students. Yes, I would prefer my children not needing to rely on a webcam for virtual instruction. But in order to properly distance, that is what needs to happen. In person instruction at full capacity is not ideal at this time. Our school, Barclay, is already overcrowded. Art and Music were already brought into the homeroom classes as a result. How is it even appropriate to place our children and teachers into such an environment when distance is the best mitigation strategy?

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		I understand children are not returning to school as they knew it. However, if we can control capacity, we can potentially give them a closer to “normal” environment. Packing our children into these schools to the minimum standards shows we care minimally about their and their teacher’s lives, let alone mental health.

As the parent of a rising senior and a rising freshman, I feel strongly that ALL students need the opportunity to be in the school building 5 days per week. At the secondary education level, the degree of abstract and critical thinking needed to be successful in learning does not lend itself well to a distance learning approach. Even with the best of engaged teachers, there are distractions at home and a feeling of isolation that cannot be ignored. How does one learn a brand new math like Calculus, which is difficult enough under ideal circumstances, when being at home? Students risk losing the fine classroom skills that they have so effectively learned over the years and they certainly risk being prepared for college. As the parent of a child entering 12th grade, it concerns me greatly that my child may be ill-prepared for the challenges of attending a university. In addition to actual school learning, there is also great concern for students emotional well-being. Having witnessed distance learning in the spring, there was most certainly a lack of community that our children desperately need. I understand that the carefree interaction that we are used to has to be suspended for a while, but there is something to be said for being with your classmates and with your teachers. Questions may get asked in the classroom that a student may not feel comfortable posing over a Teams meeting. They can make eye contact and joke in a way that is impossible over the internet. Certainly, the value of these interactions cannot be dismissed. My other concern with distance learning is the lack of structure...some teachers were online and live each class while others scheduled later class meetings or didn’t have a live class at all. While this may have been OK for the end of the last school year when we all hoped that we would be able to return, it is certainly not a reasonable solution as we prepare to begin a new school year. To my knowledge, survey results indicated parents strongly approved of a return to school with safety guidelines in place. Meg Griffin	Newtown, Bucks County	My name is Meg Griffin and I am a teacher at Cold Spring Elementary and am writing on my own behalf to ask that the board members and administration address the following questions and concerns at tonight's meeting. I am extremely concerned about the proposed reopening plan. As an RN and teacher I have been reading and studying professional journals in regards to Covid-19 and the elementary school population. I have been doubly diligent in my attention to this matter since I am also considered to be high risk for Covid complications due to my health conditions. I believe it is foolish and reckless to consider putting elementary age students, children with special needs, children with mental health needs, and medically fragile children and adults in our school buildings five full days a week.
		We teachers definitely wish we could get back to "normal." However, we know that what we will be going back to is anything but normal. Students will need to socially distance and wear masks. The "fun" things we do to make school engaging – class meetings on the carpet, hands-on science experiments, classroom celebrations and parties, school wide assemblies, chorus, instruments, field trips....- will not be possible.
		As the board considers our reopening plan I would like you to consider some of these questions:
		• How will students who receive pull-out services (Learning Support, PEN, Autistic Support, Speech etc) receive services? Will they move from homeroom to another small group and then back again?
		• What exactly will be done to improve ventilation and air flow in the classrooms? For example Cold Spring has windows that open only a small bit. I have heard that the doors are to be kept open to increase airflow, how does this work with intruder safety concerns?
		• Does our HVAC system utilize air recirculation in the building? Are the filters being upgraded to a quality proven to reduce virus load – greater than or equal to MERV13? Have we considered using portable HEPA air filters?
		• Since students will be spaced so far apart, and teachers will be wearing masks, will the district provide voice amplification systems for teachers?
		• How will we stagger arrival and dismissal so that we do not have large numbers of students in the hallways? Cold Spring has typically had a large amount of students dropped off early by parents and then they congregate in the vestibule until school is opened. How will this be prevented?

The truth is that no one really knows 100% what will happen, but I urge you to err on the side of caution.

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Kimberly Ciepiela	Warwick Twp	<p>I am the parent of three CBSD students and I am very concerned about the options presented for our children to return to school this fall. I am deeply frustrated that our administration is falling prey to the fear-based reporting that is being fed to us by Governor Wolf as well as by the media rather than following the recommendations from Dr Damsker and the APA that are based on science and logic. I am a registered nurse in a local hospital and have taken care of many covid patients- all of whom got sick because they were not practicing any type of safety precautions at the time of their exposure, all of whom were adults. The evidence has shown over and over that kids are not getting this virus as freely as adults, aren't transmitting it to adults or other children if they do become infected, and aren't getting sick with anywhere the same level as our oldest adults. There are roughly 18,000 students in CBSD. If 1% of them becomes infected with CV (roughly how much of the US population that has become infected), that's 180 students. Of those 180 kids, roughly 0.00004% will die. The number is incalculable. We are upending thousands of students lives for a virus that has less chance of killing them than of them getting into a car accident on the way to school. The flu has a similar death rate for kids and we don't do this for flu season (I know the flu is SUPPOSEDLY less contagious but do we REALLY know that because NEVER before, in the history of the world, have we tested asymptomatic carriers). The coronavirus is a weak virus that is easily killed with soap&amp;water/bleach/really any all-purpose cleaning solutions. If we wash our hands before and after eating and using the bathroom, mask indoors, distance as much as feasible (3ft is sufficient per Dr. Damsker), then the absolute risk is almost non-existent. We also cannot forget the secondary affects that social isolation this will have on kids that do not have the ideal home life- I can assure you they will be far more impactful than the physical effects of this virus will ever do to the kids in CBSD. Our numbers are up slightly in this area but we are testing significantly more people than we were in March/April. Back then, roughly 10% of those tested were positive and we were only testing the sickest of the sick. Now we are testing anyone that wants to be tested and only have a 5.4% positive rate (found on the PA DOH website).</p>
		As a parent and healthcare professional, I am concerned for the physical, mental, and social well-being of our children. I urge you all to consider following science and logic rather than fear to guide your decision.

I also realize that, lacking any ideal scenario, whatever you decide with surely disappoint and frustrate some, if not all, of those constituents. As a teacher in a nearby district with elementary-age students in Central Bucks, I am facing a smaller-scale dilemma of the same sort in my own home. Should my district opt to require teachers to return to their buildings, that will necessitate a place for my own children to go, and I'm sure the same is true for Central Bucks teachers who are in a similar situation. For that reason, I appreciate the option to send my children to school for the full five days, but I do have a few questions:
		1. Will there be opportunities for mask breaks at intervals throughout the day? Is there any discussion around shortening the school day, particularly for younger students?
		2. I don't know if it would unnecessarily complicate matters, but would any thought be given to allowing families to opt for either 2 days/week or 4 days/week in a hybrid model? This would still allow for deep cleaning midway through the week, younger students might benefit from a midweek break from masking and strict social distancing, and finding alternative childcare/virtual learning support would be less burdensome if it was only for one day. This could also allow teachers a needed break and more flexible prep time during that Wednesday time frame. Families that are more flexible with home care and supervision could still opt for the 2 day/week depending on their needs.
		3. Would primarily windowless classrooms like those in Pine Run be provided with HEPA air filters to improve circulation and filtration of air particles?

		Current CDC health and safety guidelines can NOT be truly met in our schools. There is not enough room for real (6 foot apart) social distancing protocols, in classrooms or the hallways, and certainly not enough time or supplies to clean between groups of students. Masks can NOT be optional, it's currently a state mandate, and face shields are meant to be worn with masks, not instead of them.
		I can't say it enough, I LOVE my job! It means EVERYTHING to me to work with my students, to watch them grow in their knowledge and abilities, but I don't feel safe at all going back in person. I have health concerns of my own, but I'm concerned for EVERYONE.
		I do realize that virtual isn't the same as in person, particularly with what I teach, but I would feel so much safer continuing the hard work that I started this spring to revamp my curriculum so it's still vigorous, interesting and appropriate for my students to do at home. I learned new technologies to create lessons, videos and projects that were very similar if not exactly the same as what my students would have gotten with me in person. I live taught and held office hours to answer questions. While there were differences, I do believe I delivered a high quality education for my students. I know I can continue to do a high quality job, safely from home.
		PLEASE, follow the science. Losing even one child, teacher, para professional, custodian, cafeteria worker, administrator, or family member is simply NOT an acceptable loss.
		Keep schools 100% virtual until COVID 19 is truly under control, with a well tested vaccine, so no one dies from going to school.

April Sedutto	Doylestown Township	We previously submitted an email to our board member showing support for Friday's plan with Hybrid and 100% Virtual options for elementary students. Unfortunately, we learned through social media and the CBSD website that the plan was changed today without notice.

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		We continue to prefer a Hybrid and 100% Virtual plan for the start of the 2020-21 year. We would like the option for a green phase 5-day traditional elementary plan to be revisited later in the year. By significantly reducing the number of children in classrooms and buses this Fall and Winter, it appears the Hybrid plan will best address the health and safety of in-person learning for teachers, students and support staff.
		Unfortunately, it seems that the metrics and indicators we are using to gauge risk (green, yellow, red) are quite delayed right now and fraught with political and economic tension. They also don't account for everyone's August vacation travel plans, late summer parties, etc. As an example, we share with you that a family member recently took a Covid-19 test on July 8th. They did not receive results until Monday, July 20. 12 days later. They called and checked on it several times. It wasn't a fluke - we've heard of other people with similar test dates and experiences. The high case counts in other parts of the country, state and region are significantly clouding our decision-making capabilities here at home.
		By starting with a 5-day elementary program in green phase (and without a mandatory travel quarantine period), we will be opening up the plan to a lot of confusion, anxiety, late-night reversals and lost teaching time when cases climb and Bucks County switches to yellow. Working parents will be scrambling to find adequate care and may make unsafe, last-minute decisions. Friendships formed in the first few weeks will be split apart again as 5-day children are moved to separate hybrid schedules. Honestly, it sounds like a repeat of the many negative consequences we experienced when schools closed in the Spring with little planning and notice.
		Please delay your decision until you can collect more feedback from the thousands of families that were unaware of the plan change tonight. Please don't reopen the 5-day schedule too soon. Across the nation, we've seen the consequences of reopening too broadly and too quickly. It would be unfortunate to make the same mistake with our schools.

Erin Corrigan	Hilltown (but employee of Central Bucks)	My name is Erin Corrigan. I am a Linden teacher and President of the Central Bucks Education Association.
		The three Associations that represent the teachers, support staff, and transportation employees in Central Bucks School District are united in their advocacy for the safe return of students and staff for the new school year.
		The overwhelming majority of medical experts have advocated the need for face coverings, limiting exposure time, and a distance of 6 ft as the appropriate protection.
		In every other decision the district makes, the safest measure has always been the appropriate course. On March 13th the district closed completely because of one case of COVID 19. That closure was "out of an abundance of caution." As it turns out, that was the appropriate action. Then the state mandated the closure for the rest of the year. Seeing how much the virus spread, that was the appropriate action. The state removed the opportunity for people to make dangerous decisions that would affect others.
		In forming the plan for the reopening of school for the fall, the district is choosing to take a course of action that is not the safest course of action, and does not approach the education with that same "abundance of caution" that we have come to rely on for everyone's safety. Ignoring the recommendations for limiting exposure by not being present 5 days a week, and keeping 6 ft apart both in school and on the bus flies in the face of keeping children and staff safe.
		The community should contact the district and demand they follow the recommendations of the CDC, PA Dept. of Health, and PA Dept of Ed. to keep children and staff safe.

Instead of live streaming classrooms, what if we had designated teachers per grade/content area to teach online? I have heard from some teachers the worry that they will be live streamed and will have to tend to the needs of the children in the classroom as well as the children at home and that just does not seem feasible.
Nicole Maio	Buckingham	First, I must admit that I am truly blessed that I am a former middle school educator who now has the privilege of running an independent business from home; I am here all day and am more than capable of helping my 8th grade and 10th grade sons with distance learning. I know, though, that there are many parents who are essential workers who need their children back in school so they don't have to pay for childcare. I am in no way, shape, or form dismissing them. I feel badly for them; I really do. However, the teachers who are being forced to return to the classroom also have my sympathy. I don't know that if I were still teaching, I would be able to do it.
		Also, just some thoughts on distance learning vs. the hybrid model to think about and discuss:
		1. I think most educators would agree that setting and sticking to routines is one of the single most important parts of creating an effective learning environment. I mean, how many days and weeks are dedicated just to that in September? If schools open in September, and there is an outbreak in the community and schools are then required to shut down, what will that look like? I know for my boys, in March, the first two weeks of distance learning while everyone adjusted were wasted weeks. Would the kids who were in the building doing the hybrid model pick up where the kids who are doing distance learning are, or would they be taught by the teachers who were teaching them in class, and how would that disruption in their learning and routine effect them ultimately?
		2. I actually think the hybrid model would work well for the humanities, but I cannot fathom a way it works for math and science. Picture this: Susie is in school on Monday and Tuesday. In math on Monday, Susie is taught how to multiply fractions. She goes home to do her homework, and it is corrected in class on Tuesday. Susie had some problems...she doesn't quite get it. Her teacher works with her and helps her out. Susie is taught another skill...dividing fractions, let's say, on Tuesday. Susie goes home and practices independently on Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday, but Susie, once again, didn't quite get it. Susie has now committed to memory the incorrect way to do the math problems and come Monday, Susie's teacher has some major reteaching to do.
		Now, imagine this scenario from the teacher's perspective knowing little Susie probably isn't the only one who needs reteaching, but she has another group of kids to teach on Thursday and Friday, so she can't worry about Susie et. al. until Monday morning. The pace in which that teacher will be able to get through the math curriculum will be a snail's pace. On the other hand, the kids who are home, get math instruction every day, are retaught at an appropriate time and move through the curriculum faster and are able to get into more depth. Now, we have inequitable learning.

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		3. Finally, I understand that our children's social and emotional needs need to be taken into careful consideration. However, school where everyone is wearing masks, no one is eating in the cafeteria or talking at the lockers or doing group projects, and where everyone is social distancing is hardly "social". The anxiety that type of environment will cause for students will only exacerbate the anxiety they are already feeling. Then, God forbid, a child or teacher dies due to the spread of the virus...talk about psychological ramifications!
		I know there is no perfect solution, and I do not envy you having to weigh all of these opinions and make a decision. I will, of course, support the district and teachers regardless of what decisions are made. I truly wish we weren't in this situation. I also want to say, if there is any way in which I can help, please feel free to reach out. I feel helpless and really would do anything to help our kids in any way possible.

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Kimberly Sciorillo	Warwick	I would like to know why the district would have only a two day hybrid model and not a three/two bi-weekly hybrid model giving the kids more time in school? By this I mean (for example) on week one, children with last names A-L would go to school Mon, Tues, Wed and children M-Z would go Thursday and Friday. The following week A-L would go Mon, Tues and M-Z would go Wed, Thurs and Fri. Alternating the Wednesday between groups so that every other week they are in school three days. There does not need to be a 24 hour cleaning time in the schools. I am a nurse who works in an outpatient surgical center and we use the same gurneys, as well as cardiac, BP and Pulse ox monitors on 8-10 patients per day. We, the nurses, thoroughly wipe down the equipment between patients so I don't see why teachers can't wipe down desks and other materials at the end of each day or send in a cleaning company that will work in the evening or overnight if you're that concerned. Not utilizing one day per week for in person instruction makes no sense and our children need to be in school as much as possible. It is my understanding that other school districts are considering this model as well.
		I would also like to suggest that the time "in school" should be spent on core subjects for longer lengths of time rather than on "specials". I am not trying to send teachers to the unemployment line but specials need to take a back seat to core subjects given the current situation. 		The virus has not been shown to be severe in children. So far Covid has killed 30 children in the U.S.--this year's flu season by contrast has killed 122 yet we never considered closing schools for it. Kids have shown in studies to have mild or no symptoms and spread to adults is rare. Most of our teachers are not in the 55 and up age range of the covid-vulnerable population.
		The American Academy of Pediatrics recommends in-person learning, as does the CDC, the HHS secretary and hundreds of other physicians who have signed a petition recommending that schools open. Schoola all over the world have opened with different mitigation strategies that can be studied for each's effectiveness or not.

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		Child abuse, online child sex trafficking, child sex abuse, anxiety, depression, drug and alcohol use, are all on the rise in our nation's kids due to covid shutdowns and a switch to online schooling. Now, with just under a few weeks before the first day of school, we, the teachers, are being told that we may have to go back for a full week of instruction, in the classroom in the middle of a global pandemic and with little time to prepare for a new class of students.
		Teachers are problem solvers and we will do whatever it takes to help students. If we do not have enough time to grade papers while at work, we spend our evenings and weekends grading. If we need supplies for our classrooms to necessitate basic learning, we buy them ourselves with our own funds. If we have no air conditioning in our buildings, we make due on our own, buying fans and bringing in ice pops so that our students can learn in a comfortable environment. Teachers find a way to get the job done.
		This past spring, we taught ourselves in a matter of days a variety of new technology and online teaching methods to give our students the best chance of learning during this pandemic crisis.



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		Now, I cannot sleep at night. I can't sleep because I am fearful that one of my 7-year-old students might catch a virus that not even the nation's top infectious disease experts fully understand. I can't sleep because I worry that I might bring home a virus to my husband, a cancer survivor, or my children. I can't sleep because while I am a problem solver, I can't solve this problem.
		Children need to feel safe to achieve a well-rounded education, but our students will not feel safe in an atmosphere that does not ensure their safety. Our teachers should feel safe as well. Please consider the health and safety of our future before determining how to educate our children.

We received an email from the Superintendent last Friday evening that spoke nothing of this option. I understand that guidelines continue to change daily but the lack of communication is frustrating.

Kim Cizerle	Buckingham	I support a science-based approach to making the decision about re-opening schools. The proposal outlined in Dr. Kopicki's July 16 e-mail met this criterion — it was based on PDE/PADOH guidance that is based on the most recent scientific consensus about virus transmission. This guidance, also consistent with CDC guidance, calls for wearing masks indoors and distancing 6' "to the maximum extent feasible." While that leaves wiggle room for something slightly less than 6' distancing every minute of the school day, it clearly does not envision that 3' distancing would be used as the standard. The 6' distance is based on numerous studies that the virus travels 6', or even farther, depending on what the person is doing (talking, coughing, etc.). The 3' distancing is based on older WHO guidance and older assumptions about the virus, not the current scientific consensus and understanding about virus transmission.
		The latest document CBSD posted online with the agenda for tonight's July 21 Board meeting seems to envision "traditional" schooling for some and "hybrid" for others, with "traditional" schooling following 3' distancing and "hybrid" following 6'. Negotiating a 3' distance for some students, based on older WHO guidance and assumptions, is not a science-based decision-making approach. The virus does not negotiate its transmission distance to facilitate having students in school full time.
		I support re-opening schools, and I think students learn best in the company of teachers and peers. We can negotiate how much time students spend in school, but we cannot negotiate with the virus about the conditions under which it will spread. The "hybrid" model offers the best way to balance the need for kids to be in school with the need to follow public health guidance to protect our students, teachers, families, and community.

It is too dangerous to our students, teachers and all staff and community members to allow any in person instruction. Thank you.
Daniela Nussbaumer	Plumstead	Can you address if you are offering before and after school care in the elementary schools for single and working parents? This is a very important topic for people. Thank you.
Steven Piperno	Doylestown Township	I'm commenting on the Phased School Reopening Health and Safety Plan published the evening of July 20, 2020. Previously, Dr. Kopicki announced there would be two options for returning to school: (1) Hybrid and (2) Online. However, your plan references an additional option for elementary students consisting of "Total reopen." I have the following questions and concerns about your plan.

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		1. Why was there a sudden change in the plan with minimal notification just a few days after Dr. Kopicki announced a path forward that would minimize exposure to COVID-19? He states "It became clear to our leadership that given the space limitations within our 23 schools, it would be impossible to offer a traditional option and meet the social distancing requirements included in the orders." Specifically, what has changed since arriving at this conclusion that would warrant full reopening?
		2. Why would you recommend total reopening for all students during a global pandemic when cases continue to rise?
		3. The CDC's guidance is as follows. It would appear as though you're offering a plan that would be somewhere in between "More Risk" and "Highest Risk." Can you please explain your justification for exposing our children, family and educators to more risk than is necessary?
		a. Lowest Risk: Students and teachers engage in virtual-only classes, activities, and events.
		b. More Risk: Small, in-person classes, activities, and events. Groups of students stay together and with the same teacher throughout/across school days and groups do not mix. Students remain at least 6 feet apart and do not share objects (e.g., hybrid virtual and in-person class structures, or staggered/rotated scheduling to accommodate smaller class sizes).
		c. Highest Risk: Full sized, in-person classes, activities, and events. Students are not spaced apart, share classroom materials or supplies, and mix between classes and activities.
		4. Your plan uses language such as "to the greatest extent feasible." For example, you say "The minimum three-feet distance or six-feet distance for the hybrid model, will be imposed to the greatest extent feasible." Why would you implement a plan in which you cannot guarantee safety during a global pandemic?
		5. Given the short timeframe between Dr. Kopicki's announcement and your release of the Phased Reopening Plan, along with the contradictory nature of your plan, it feels as though partisan politics may be involved instead of the best interests, safety and health of our children, educators and staff, and families. I hope you reconsider your approach to align with what was originally announced by Dr. Kopicki.

		2. Given that you intend to temperature test each child, every day, how will you track and report the results to parents and staff? For example, will there be a website that is updated daily reporting statistics of how many children/staff had high temperatures and were turned away from the building? I am assuming that those with a high temperature will be turned away. Is that true?
		3. If a child/staff member has a high temperature, will they be required to take a COVID -19 test?
		4. If one child in a family with multiple children who attend the school tests with a high temperature, will all the children in that family be required to have a COVID-19 test?

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		5. If a child/staff tests positive for COVID-19 are they required to quarantine for 2-3 weeks? Does every other student and teacher they have been around quarantine?
		6. What is the contact tracing process? Will the school take responsibility for notifying parents/staff of possible contact with a person who tested with a high temperature? testing positive for COVID-19 ? Or will the school post this information on the daily updated website? Or will the school report this to a state entity with that responsibility? Do we all get notified if our child “may have been in contact” with someone who tested positive?
		7. Considering the additional stress this may put on teachers and staff, is there a plan to monitor their mental/emotional well being and their ability to perform their jobs effectively? What is the process for addressing parental concerns? What is the strategy for mental/grief counselors available to monitor and provide direction for both students and staff?
		Again, we appreciate your diligence in ensuring our children can continue their learning journey in a safe environment.

Why are you not listening to the 81% of families that believe our kids should go back to the classroom safely. Central Bucks school District should have three options for both elementary and secondary students.

The only way that CBSD can meet the social distancing measures set forth on July 16 by the state of PA for K-12 schools (requiring a minimum of 6 feet distance) is through hybrid or virtual. As noted in Dr. Kopicki's communication on July 17, any fully in-person option would not allow for adequate distancing within the school buildings, thus CBSD would not be following the state guidelines while putting students and teachers at risk. A minimum of 6 feet social distancing and face coverings are absolutely imperative to the reopening of schools to keep students and teachers safe. 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Andrew Bullard	Buckingham	<p>Less than a week ago, the CB community was informed that school reopening would be predicated on two distinct options - remote only, and hybrid consisting of part in-person and part remote learning. Less than 24 hours ago, that changed to include a traditional, entirely in-person option for elementary students. Simultaneously, emerging data from the state of Pennsylvania and Bucks County specifically show what actual scientists have been suggesting for weeks, that we would see an increase in number and rate of infections as mitigation measures have been rolled back, as well as increased impacts like hospitalizations that lag behind the increased spread of infection. Despite what some would say and/or want to believe, including from positions of authority, COVID is real, COVID is serious, children are not immune, children can and do spread infection, and schools are not closed systems. I would like very much to believe that the plan being considered by the Board tonight represents the best possible science available regarding COVID. Unfortunately, I can't say that I do, and I hate that feeling. Giving the CB community less than 24 hours notice to react and respond to a significant change in course is beyond disappointing. Looking at the plan made available in the meeting agenda, I find positives and I find ambiguities, and I question how a traditional elementary approach would not negate the protections afforded by the hybrid approach. In my opinion, a traditional back to school approach is the most likely path to shutting schools down again at some point in the coming school year. Regardless, it is entirely clear that this is the plan you will take up and you will vote on. After providing so much communication early in the pandemic, back to school planning has been anything but transparent. You have created a trust gap in this community, and that is not leading the way in any way. You have serious work to do to earn that trust back, and I hope you recognize and embrace that. And, as a parting thought, it is not lost on me or many others that you consider this plan of putting students back in schools, some potentially full time, during a remote meeting because it is considered unsafe to do this business in person. I have a 1st grader that I ideally would love to have attend 5 days a week in person, but really feel I would need to see the details behind what that plan would look like to determine if I felt it will be safe for him. I was quite surprised to hear that the district decided they couldn't offer 5 day in person instruction due to the updated guidelines and then turned around and decided to offer it anyway. Every school is different in our district so I feel that we need to give parents specific details around how many kids will be in a classroom per school and grade if they pick the 100% in person compared to the hybrid model - explain max amount of kids that we can have in a classroom to fit 3ft between them and max amount with 6ft in mind? I believe North Penn had given the maxes for the in person and hybrid model when they shared their plans. I also feel that we need to understand exactly what the curriculum would look like if parents pick the 100% in person compared to the hybrid model? We need much more detailed information then is stated in your draft plan to make an informed decision of what to do. For example, in Philadelphia plan they spelled out exactly what a day would like for a student attending school under the hybrid model as well as for the 100% virtual model. Understanding the difference between the education my child will receive in person versus what he would learn on the virtual days will be a huge deciding factor for me determining which plan I will select for him. Did I hear somewhere that under the hybrid model that the kids on a virtual day would be live streaming with the teacher and class that was currently in session? If that is the case then details should be shared on what parents could expect and to what extent a parent will need to be prepared to assist the child with their work so we can be fully prepared when deciding on what option is best for us. I am in favor of giving parents 3 options for elementary kids as they are the ones that I think will need the most assistance with their schoolwork as well they are the ones that current research support that they don't spread the virus whereas the older children almost are more inclined to spread the virus as an adult would. There are a lot of people advocating on why we shouldn't open up but those families can then choose what scenarios are right for their families and the 3 options allow for that. That said, I want to make sure that all scenarios are safe for both students AND staff.</p>

Is it possible to have a morality clause in place for all parents to sign that they will not send child in if they are sick with the following symptoms or have traveled to areas that have been recognized as hot spots and need to quarantine prior to returning to school? That said, we would need a plan in place for what plan those kids who are quarantining need to follow during that timeline - for example would they jump into a 100% online plan during that time frame that was following a similar curriculum?</p>

I keep hearing that the main issue here is keeping kids safe. Listed on the CDC website it says there were about 160 or so kids under 25 that have died since the beginning of this. (most of these kids are age 15 – 24 and my guess is that most had other pre-existing conditions going on) To say that our kids are at risk if we send the back to school at this point with the facts that are known and not just speculated is not true. Lets be clear that the risk to our kids being back in school is not to the kids themselves; the risk is to the kids bringing something back into the home to someone who may be older or compromised in some way. I don't remember seeing the results of the survey that was done by CBSD but there is a larger one done on Patch in PA which the results showed a 50/50 when asked if they were comfortable sending their kids back. Ok, if those numbers are correct then we should be able to offer 2 options. One for parents who want to or need keep their kids at home and one for parents who want to send their kids to school full time without any restrictions. (ie. No masks no social distancing etc.) The ones who aren't comfortable or teachers who aren't comfortable can do distance learning. If there is someone with a condition that makes them at higher risk or a parent or grand parent at home let them stay home and do distance learning. 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		I implore the Board to open the school this Fall for 5 days/week for those who want to send their children. Being an only parent and an essential worker who cannot work remotely, it is imperative for me to have my 8 yo daughter in school full time. In addition to the decline of education in the last semester, there was also a loss of social interaction for her. My daughter has been attending camp 5 days/wk through Children's Village and it has been great--the children have to wash their hands before entering the building and throughout the day, in addition to their temp being taken at drop-off. I am concerned that this decision is solely based on what the teachers want, and the decision should be focused on what is best for the children. I do not want my daughter's education to suffer as it did in the Spring, and there are safe, effective ways children can attend school in person, so those options should be fully explored for full time in person education. The children, especially in the ES, can stay in one classroom with the same teacher the majority of the day, and they can be educated on proper handwashing and mask wearing (which most already are). The lunch period can be staggered, with disinfecting in between groups, and the plan should be to have as many classes outside if weather permits, with those staggered as well. Children should have their temps taken when they arrive in the morning, and hand washing upon arrival and throughout intervals during the day. Teachers should not have a say in whether the schools should open full-time for in person instruction--I am an essential worker and do not have the luxury of saying I don't want to work. Teachers should be in the same category--a lot of people are working in person, safely, so the teachers should be required to do so as well, with safety precautions in place. Other surrounding districts in Bucks and Mont. Christine DiPilla	Doylestown Borough	I previously submitted a comment thanking Dr Kopicki for the 2 option plan that ensured the continued safety and health of our community. This morning, it was brought to my attention in a Facebook group, of all places, that there is now a third option being offered for 5 day a week, in-person instruction in elementary schools. As someone who planned to send my elementary school age child in under the hybrid option, I am beyond disappointed. This third option compromises the safety of our teachers and our community. While risk of death to younger children is low, it is not only about the children, but the staff who serves them, their families, families of the children themselves, and, by proxy, our entire community.

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		Dr Kopicki stated that “It became clear to our leadership that given the space limitations within our 23 schools, it would be impossible to offer a traditional option and meet the social distancing requirements included in the orders.” So why is a traditional option now on the table?
		It appears to me that this option is being offered to this age group only because some parents are struggling with childcare. And I do understand that struggle, but I believe there are other options than using our schools as a day care center. This is where “it takes a village” comes into play.
		It has become made clear to many parents that there has been an aggressive push to offer a 5 day option by an online group who cites childcare issues as a main concern. That group is also encouraging its members to withhold property tax and defund schools. I hope your decision to offer a traditional option isn’t based on intimidation. Especially considering very vocal members of that group have connections that spotlight a conflict of interest.

Will they receive grades or will the Pass/Fail system be used again, and then everyone receives a Pass grade at the end of the school year? High School students need grades on their transcripts for college acceptance and validation they are learning the material. Will AP classes be taught as originally expected? High school students need rigor in their course load for college acceptance. What will the academic plan be for Wednesdays when both groups of students are NOT in the schools? Will it be a continuation of teaching the same subject matter that is covered on M-TH, T-F or something entirely different?

Previously, Dr. Kopicki announced there would be two options for returning to school: (1) Hybrid and (2) Online. However, your plan references an additional option for elementary students consisting of "Total reopen." I have the following questions and concerns about your plan.
		1. Why was there a sudden change in the plan with minimal notification just a few days after Dr. Kopicki announced a path forward that would minimize exposure to COVID-19? He states "It became clear to our leadership that given the space limitations within our 23 schools, it would be impossible to offer a traditional option and meet the social distancing requirements included in the orders." Specifically, what has changed since arriving at this conclusion that would warrant full reopening?
		2. Why would you recommend total reopening for all students during a global pandemic when cases continue to rise?
		3. The CDC's guidance is as follows. It would appear as though you're offering a plan that would be somewhere in between "More Risk" and "Highest Risk." Can you please explain your justification for exposing our children, family and educators to more risk than is necessary?
		4. Your plan uses language such as "to the greatest extent feasible." For example, you say "The minimum three-foot distance or six-foot distance for the hybrid model, will be imposed to the greatest extent feasible." Why would you implement a plan in which you cannot guarantee safety during a global pandemic?
		5. Given the short timeframe between Dr. Kopicki's announcement and your release of the Phased Reopening Plan, along with the contradictory nature of your plan, it feels as though partisan politics may be involved instead of the best interests, safety and health of our children, educators and staff, and families. I hope you reconsider your approach to align with what was originally announced by Dr. Kopicki.

Although we are new to the district and the state of PA this year, I have spent the last 16 years employed as a professional with Oakland County, Michigan and am familiar with the operations and procedures of public entity Boards and public notice requirements.
