

Grade K: Thursday, May 28, 2020 Story Element: End of a story RELA LESSON Reading/Language Arts

Overview: Over the past few weeks, we have been learning about story elements. We learned all about the characters and setting within a story.

Last week we learned about the beginning, middle and now the end of a story.

Things to know:

1. Sit with mom, dad, grandparent or guardian, or your brother or sister to practice the activities for the day.
2. If you do not have the supplied worksheets or access to any of the worksheets, it is fine to create your own based off the supplied worksheets.
3. Today's lesson for reading and writing, we will focus on the end of a story.
4. Listen to the story from Book Flix and complete the story map.

Explanation: You will read/listen to a story and then be able to write the end of the story on a story map.

	Resources
1. Lesson Introduction: Review story elements	We have spent the last few weeks talking and studying story elements; characters, setting and the beginning, middle and end of a story. Knowing what the story elements are help you to be able to retell a story both verbally and be able to write it down. Today we are going to focus on the last story element for Kindergarten; the end of the story.

<p>2. Listen to the Book Flix story</p>	<p>Today, for our lesson we are going to focus on the end of a story. Listen to the Book Flix story, “ And then it was Spring.”</p> <p>https://bookflix.digital.scholastic.com/pair/detail/bk0111pr/story?authCtx=U.642726498</p>
<p>3. Do: After listening to the story, fill out the story map for the end of the story.</p>	<p>In the end of a story, the problem is usually solved or the characters complete their journey. In the story we just read/listened to, spring finally arrives. The season was winter at the beginning of the story, in the middle, the “green” of spring was starting to arrive and in the end of the story, spring definitely arrived.</p>
<p>4. Writing: Complete the story map for the middle of the story.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Please note the story map was emailed this morning. You are welcome to use a regular piece of paper to write your response as well. Thank you. 	<p>After reading/listening to the story, please complete the end section of the story map. Be sure to write and draw a detailed picture. Go back into the book if you need to. When writing the end of the story, make sure to use an uppercase letter at the beginning and punctuation at the end of the sentence. Did you remember to space in between your words? I am sure you did! There is not a lot of room on this story map paper, so please use the back or another piece of paper with lines to help with writing. Thank you.</p>

5. Extra Practice:	Once you complete the end of the story on the story map, if you would like, you can go back and fill in the characters, setting, beginning and middle of the story.
6. How is this assignment turned into the teacher?	Upon completion of the end of the story section of the story map, submit a picture of it to your teacher. We can also “conference” about your work if you are having difficulty during my “office hours”. Thank you
7. Independent Reading	Remember to independently read today. You could choose a book you know how to read all by yourself, curl up in a comfy place in your house and read to a favorite stuffed friend. If you chose a more difficult book, maybe you could read with an older brother/sister or mom/dad. Happy Reading!
