Be, being, is, am, are, was, were

- The clouds <u>were</u> in the sky.
- The clouds <u>hung</u> in the sky.

- I <u>am</u> very tired.
- Exhaustion overwhelms my body.

# Use Synonyms for "Said"

- The man said, "I am next in line."
- The man bellowed, "I am next in line"
- The man whined, "I am next in line."
- The man threatened, "I am next in line."
- The man scolded, "I am next in line."

# Sentence Branching

I drove my car to the beach.

• \_\_\_\_\_, I drove my car to the beach.

• I drove my car, \_\_\_\_\_\_, to the beach.

#### Front Branch

• Hurriedly, I drove my car to the beach.

• After getting off work, I drove my car to the beach.

• With my best friend sitting next to me, I drove my car to the beach.

#### Middle Branch

• I drove my car, <u>radio blasting</u>, to the beach.

• I drove my car, <u>a '68 Chevy</u>, to the beach.

• I drove my car, <u>without asking permission</u>, to the beach.

#### **End Branch**

• I drove my car to the beach, <u>hoping to find a</u> good parking spot.

• I drove my car to the beach, <u>unaware of the</u> <u>policeman behind me</u>.

• I drove my car to the beach, <u>praying the</u> waves would be good.

# Put it all together

1. The pizza was good.

- 2. The pizza tasted fresh. (change the verb)
- 3. The pizza, piping hot from the oven, tasted fresh. (add a middle branch)

4. Piping hot from the oven, the pizza tasted fresh. (reorganize to a front branch)
