Title of Article: Reading #2: Fastening Systems and Hand Tools

Step 1—Read/Review Article

Read the article. It may be beneficial to review the article with a small group. In this group you can discuss key concepts and any confusing information. Use some paper or the back of this page to organize key ideas for your individual reflection. The written reflection needs to be your own work, but you can discuss ideas with your classmates.

Some main points to focus on are:

The different types of nails and screws, different fasteners for different materials, glues, use and care of hand tools, driving wood screws, different types of saws and their application, chisels and their care.

Step 2—Individual Written Reflection (typed)

Write a one page reflection of the article. You are welcome to summarize ideas from the article, but do not copy directly from the text. Please reflect on the topics below, how the information applies to your class work, how it relates to your experiences and knowledge, and how you plan to incorporate the information throughout the class.

Please include the flowing topics in your reflection:

- -Describe different types of nails and screws, and the different applications of each
- -Describe how nails and screws provide the "holding power" to hold pieces together, how do nails and screws differ? How did we use screws on the clock?
- -How is glue used? What type of glue did we use on the clock?
- -Describe the care and use of screwdrivers
- -Figure 10-22 illustrates an important concept, please summarize this concept an describe how this concept applies to your clock
- -Describe some different types of saws and their uses
- -Describe the use and care of a wood chisel
- -VOCUABULARY from the article must be included in your reflection
