If you have an amazon echo or dot at home, all you have to do is say "Alexa" to bring it to life. But when asked, this machine gives you more than just the weather. She can order amazon items, act as blue tooth speakers on demand, and

tell you a knock-knock joke when the room grows dull. A six-year-old girl's conversation with Alexa went viral this month when it ended up with her parents being charged with a \$150 dollhouse and six pounds of cookies.

The thing about the echo dot or the echo is that it must always be listening in order to hear, "Alexa," right? Is it just us, or does this give anyone else the creeps?

The idea that Alexa is always listening is a concern for owners of the Amazon IoT (Internet of Things) devices. If you don't want the device to listen at all, you can push the microphone button on top of the Echo or Echo Dot. Both the ring and the button turns bright red to let you know it is not listening.

Amazon also lets you review and delete things you've said to Alexa. If you go to the settings of the Alexa app, it groups your questions and requests. You can tap an entry to see more detail or replay the audio stored in the cloud so you can hear what Alexa heard. You have an option to delete what you've said to Alexa. Our idea? Unplug her! Nothing is safe!



Mrs. Hein in Family and Consumer Science and Mrs. Schmon in guidance decided to create a club that involved both Baking and Giving. The idea to bake dog treats and donate them to the Bucks County SPCA started in the summer right before this school year started. The Pennsylvania SPCA rescues animals from cruelty and neglect, rehabilitates them, and places them with new, loving families. The CB Cares Educational Foundation is funding the supplies for this year's club through a grant.



Since the club started in October, hundreds dog treats were baked and donated to the SPCA. The club started out with one basic recipe, but so much has changed since the beginning based on student input. Club leaders, Allie Evan (9), Emily McCreary (8) and Jessica Donlevie (7), have worked closely with Mrs. Schmon and Mrs. Hein to develop and shape club goals. They have also introduced knot fleece blankets. The owners of the Doylestown Veterinary Hospital and Holiday House Pet Resort donated the funds to buy the mounds of fleece fabric to make the blankets.

Clubs are held in the Family and Consumer Science classroom after school until 3:30. Meetings are held on the first and second Friday of every month. Students sign up in guidance for each club date as their schedule allows.
