Problem-Solving Vocabulary

Here are some important words to understand about solving problems.

alternatives one of two or more things to choose from; choices; options

The teacher asked the students to make a list of alternatives for their class trip.

conflict | a struggle or disagreement between parties with differences in information, personal experience, values, needs, or wants

Jason ignored his brother's teasing in order to avoid further **conflict**.

evaluate | to judge the success, value, or condition of something

Take time to **evaluate** how well you solved the problem.

outcome the result or conclusion of a problem; how something ends

Louis was glad the meeting with his teacher produced a positive **outcome**.

perspective | a person's point of view about a situation or problem

Melissa tried to see the problem from Joe's perspective.

problem

an obstacle; an unresolved situation or question that requires a solution or answer

Brendan knew he had a **problem** when he saw water under the sink.

pros and cons the positive and negative aspects of something

Corey made a list of the **pros and cons** of taking the job at the grocery store.

resources | a source of supply or support

When faced with a problem, think of the resources you have to help you.

solution | an action or process of solving a problem; the answer to a problem

Kevin knew that organizing his desk was the best solution to his problem of misplacing his homework.

Four Steps to Solve Problems

Use these four steps to solve your problems. The more you use them, the better problem-solver you'll become.

1. Identify the problem.

- What is the problem?
- . Who owns the problem?
- State the problem in one clear sentence.

2. Think of solutions.

- List all the ways you could solve this problem.
- What help or resources do you need?
- Look at the pros and cons of each possible solution.

3. Try a solution.

- Choose the best solution.
- Plan to try that solution.
- Sequence the steps of what to do.
- Do it!

4. Evaluate the outcome.

- Did your solution work? Why or why not?
- What could you have done differently?
- How can you avoid a similar problem in the future?
