Exploring Regions of the U.S.

Cardinal directions: north, south, east, and west are the 4 main directions on a map

equator: imaginary line at 0 degrees that divides the earth into the northern and southern hemispheres

intermediate directions: northeast, northwest, southeast, southwest

map scale: shows distance on a map

region: an area with common features

lines of latitude: imaginary lines that run east and west around the globe (parallel)

special-purpose map: a map that shows one kind of information, such as rainfall or population

lines of longitude: imaginary lines that run around the globe between the North and South poles (meridian)

map key: an explanation of what the symbols on a map stand for

global grid: the grid formed by crisscrossing lines of latitude and longitude on a map
