

► CITING GALE DATABASES ENTRIES WITH NOODLETOOLS

All of the sources in Student Resources in Context and in Opposing Viewpoints have been printed somewhere else before.

★You need to look at the date to be able to cite it in Noodletools.★

Year (2013) = Reference Source
Month and Year (MAY 2013) = Magazine or Journal
Month, Day and Year (MAY 1, 2013) = Newspaper
Season and Year = Journal (most likely)

Source Citation
Fellenz, Marc R. "Animal Rights." *Encyclopedia of Science, Technology, and Ethics*. Ed. Carl Mitcham. Vol. 1. Detroit: Macmillan Reference USA, 2005. 74-77. *Student Resources In Context*. Web. 7 Nov. 2013.

A date of publication as a year
and includes a publisher (in this example, Macmillan Reference)
it is most likely a **book** or **reference source**

REFERENCE SOURCES INCLUDE ANYTHING WITH THE WORDS *ENCYCLOPEDIA* OR *DICTIONARY* IN THE TITLE

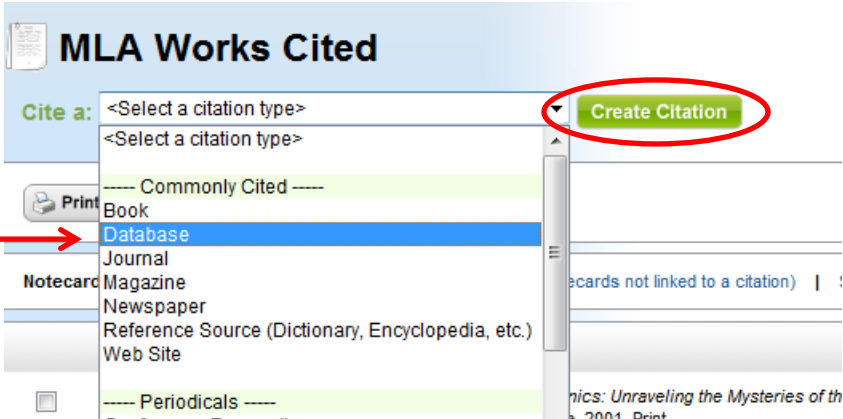

Burrough, Bryan. "The Birth of an Energy Boom." *New York Times* 3 Nov. 2013: 7(L). *Student Resources In Context*. Web. 7 Nov. 2013.

A full date of day, month, and year is most likely a **newspaper**.
Also if the title of the source has the words *Post*, *Times*, or the name of a city in it
(in this example there is a city and the word "Times"), it is probably a newspaper.

GALE Databases

The information in GALE'S databases has all been printed somewhere. It is your job to identify what the source type is.

- Using the dropdown menu select **Database** and then choose **Create Citation**.



Next, you will be asked to choose what the original source was for your article/entry. Remember to have already looked at the date in GALE's citation information. (It usually follows the article at the bottom of the web page.)

Use the URL (web page address) *from the bottom* of the GALE article you are citing. Scroll to the end of the article and it will be under the Source Citation (it's usually a very long URL). Select and right-mouse-click to copy and then paste the URL into NoodleTools.

★ Every GALE article/entry is first assigned “Database” as Citation Type.

Next, you need to choose what type of source you are citing from the database.

Remember: you need to determine what type of source it originally came from based on the date type. When it doubt, Google the name of the source.

The screen captures above are from a magazine source. Other sources (reference, journal, newspaper, etc.) will all have a different look.

Remember the 5 things you need to cite for each entry no matter the source type:

1. Name of the Database
2. Date
3. URL
4. Title of the article/entry
5. Original location of your article/entry
