

Includes all of the following:

- The analysis is thorough and detailed
- The analysis connects to the paragraph
- The analysis helps to prove the point of the paragraph ---the topic statement!
- The proof in your analysis is clear and logical (you're a lawyer --- convince the jury that the defendant is guilty!)
- The analysis makes the significance of the quote very clear to the reader



Topic statement:

People are sometimes fooled by those who present one identity, while keeping their true character hidden.

+ analysis example

Siham uses the veil to conduct an illicit relationship with Ihsan. When she watches Ihsan in the street, she realizes "there [is] nothing to stop her from feasting her eyes on him, however, because she [knows] that the veil [covers] her face and [conceals] the overwhelming attraction she [feels] for him" (Ayyoub 425). The veil enables Siham to maintain the appearance of being a virtuous girl, as defined by her society, while actually behaving in such a way that would be regarded as scandalous if it were visible. Siham is aware of how to manipulate society's constraints in a way that actually liberates her. She uses the confines of the veil to freely and openly conduct her affair with Ihsan, while maintaining the appearance of valuing and respecting her traditions.



Includes any or all of the following:

- The analysis announces to the reader that s/he is about to analyze the text: "This text shows..."
- The analysis is vague and wordy, but has no substance
- The analysis might relate to the topic statement, but does not PROVE it!
- The jury decides the defendant is not guilty because the proof in the analysis wasn't enough to convince them beyond a reasonable doubt

- analysis example

Siham uses the veil to conduct an illicit relationship with Ihsan. When she watches Ihsan in the street, she realizes "there [is] nothing to stop her from feasting her eyes on him, however, because she [knows] that the veil [covers] her face and [conceals] the overwhelming attraction she [feels] for him" (Ayyoub 425). This shows how Siham uses the veil to hide her identity, while pretending to be a proper girl who follows the beliefs of her religion.



CHECK PLUS:

- Thorough/Specific
- Detailed
- Connected to TS
- Proves TS
 - Clearly shows how it proves the topic statement

CHECK MINUS:

- Minimal
- Vague
- Not clearly connected to TS
- Doesn't really prove TS
 - Doesn't connectthe dots OR
 - Doesn't relate
