Good vs. Well

Good is an adjective that describes nouns and pronouns.

He is a good dancer. ^{noun}

Mary is a good singer. ^{noun}

The good chair is comfortable. ^{Noun}

Well is an adverb that describes verbs, or how something is done.

He sings well. ^(Tells how he sings)

She skates well. ^(Tells how she skates)

The radio does not work well. ^(Tells how the radio works)

There, Their, they're

There = adverb of place

Place the box there on the table.

Their = ownership

Their house is being painted!

They're = "they are"

They're my favorite animals.

To, Two, Too

To = preposition... starts phrase

I drove to the store.

Two = 2

Do you have two dollars?

Too = adverb... "also"... "extreme"

I am reading that book, too.

I ate too much ice cream.
