## A Penny a Day Makes a Difference

With determination and effort, we can do great things for the world. Thank you Unami for achieving such high standards and collecting a great amount of money for our Pennies for Patients fundraiser. Unami has collected over \$2,000 for families who have a child that has been affected with cancer and for research for the Leukemia and Lymphoma Cancer Research Society. The money we have gathered will help children under the age of 12 who have been diagnosed with leukemia or lymphoma.

For more in-depth information, leukemia is a type of blood cancer that affects the blood and bone marrow of one's body. Leukemia is diagnosed when a single cell in the bone marrow undergoes an alteration that makes it dissimilar from the other cells, leaving the single cell to multiply and survive exceptionally better than other cells. As for lymphoma, lymphoma is another type of blood cancer that impacts the immune system, lymphatic system, liver, bone marrow, or lungs. Lymphoma starts in the immune system with an infection-fighting cell called a lymphocyte. Lymphocytes can be found in various parts of the body such as the lymph nodes,

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spleen, thymus, bone marrow, and other areas in the body. Similar to leukemia cancer cells, lymphocytes undergo changes that makes it divergent from the other cells, causing it to grow and spread without control.

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The cancers can be treated, but it can be very costly. Yet, thanks to Unami, we will be providing aid to the affected families as well as funding researchers with the goal to find other ways to treat the patients. We hope we will be making a difference in the lives of these children. Once again, thank you Unami for pitching in and helping the boys and girls in need!


- 15) There was a 6th grade parent orientation on February 19th, and was hosted by our 9th graders.

## **Save the Tigers: Siberian Tigers**

It is estimated that the wild population of Siberian tigers is around 350 to 450 tigers worldwide. Almost all of these wild tigers live in the Southeast corner of Russia in the Sikhote-Alin mountain range, east of the Amur River. However, their former habitat included northeastern China, the Korean Peninsula, and as far west as Mongolia. They are the largest of the tiger species and can grow up to 13 feet in length and weigh up to 700 pounds.

The Siberian tiger, or Amur tiger, is a critically endangered species, with the primary threats to its survival in the wild being poaching and habitat loss from intensive logging and development. Tigers are most commonly poached for their fur and for their body parts, which are used in Traditional Chinese Medicine. It is estimated that in 1991 alone, one-third of the entire Siberian tiger population was killed to meet the demand for their bones and other parts used in the Chinese practice. This practice is now unlawful in China.

In 1993, the State Council of the People's Republic of China issued a notice declaring the use of tiger bone for medicinal purposes to be illegal. The Chinese government encouraged the Ministry of Public Health and the pharmaceutical companies to seek substitute medicines for tiger parts. However, because it is such a profitable trade -- a single tiger being \$50,000 on the international market -- the practice is still flourishing. The other vital concern for the survival of the Siberian tiger in the wild is habitat loss. Research has demonstrated that the Siberian tigers require vast forest land-scapes to survive. However, this habitat destruction is threatening the tigers' homes by fragmenting their habitat, thereby isolating them from each other. In addition to this, the continuous creation of new logging roads provides poachers with access to formerly remote areas.

For the Siberian tiger to survive in the wild, and no longer be considered as an endangered species, habitat encroachment must stop. Secondly, the thousands of years old tradition of using tiger parts for medicinal purposes must also end. There is so much that can be done to stop the extinction of this tiger species.

## **U.S. Endures Longest Government Shutdown in History**

On December 22<sup>nd</sup>, 2018, the longest government shutdown in United States history began after the federal spending legislation did not allocate \$5.7 billion to a border wall between the United States and Mexico. The border wall has long been a point of contention between Democrats and President Trump. Ending on January 25, 2019, the shutdown was a record 35 days long.

While most government agencies have been funded since October 1<sup>st</sup>, 2018, when the budget year began, other aspects of government have been scraping by on temporary extensions. The 33% of government agencies not covered by the October 1<sup>st</sup> appropriation bills to the federal budget included Trump's campaign promised border wall. Congress had until December 21<sup>st</sup> to negotiate and debate the wall along with creating the budget for the other government functions still needing funding. Congress did not concede to Donald Trump's wish for \$5.7 billion for border security; therefore, Trump did not sign the federal budget plan and the country was plunged into a partial government shutdown.

The partial government shutdown had a massive impact on the United States, as multiple government agencies were left without funding. One such agency was the FBI. The shutdown halted sensitive investigations and basic operations, and impacted important criminal, counterterrorism, and intelligence work. Members of the United States Coast Guard, people who work in our military to protect and serve our country, were forced to rely on food pantries and donations for food. The expensive coastline housing Coast Guard members need is usually offset by federal housing subsidies, but these were missed due to the shutdown.

The government shutdown left official U.S. websites sensitive to hacks. More than 80 security certificates were not renewed, including NASA's website, the Court of Appeal's website, and the Department of Justice's website.

Many Food and Drug Administration inspections were suspended if they were not considered high-risk, which caused many Americans to worry over the safety of their food. Luckily, it does not appear that any of these missed inspections caused any harm.

According to a study by Syracuse University, 42,000 immigration cases were delayed indefinitely as of January 11<sup>th</sup>, and they predicted this number would increase by 20,000 for every subsequent week of the shutdown. The Smithsonian museums were forced to shut down, losing revenue from an estimated 1.2 million visitors. Two-thirds of Smithsonian employees were furloughed.

The National Parks suffered some of the most extreme losses due to the shutdown. With barebones staff it was impossible to keep the parks functioning and safe. The Washington Post reported that at least seven people died in the parks. Waste built up and roads became unsafe. In Joshua Tree National Park, vandals cut down several of the namesake trees, which are currently in review to become an endangered species. It is still unknown how many trees, which are crucial to desert life, were cut down. Some of the damage done in Joshua Tree is permanent and others will take two hundred to three hundred years to repair. Along with the devastating loss of Joshua trees, park administrators are concerned about the possibility of vandalized historical sites and valuable artifacts being looted.

Preparation for the next hurricane season was delayed, with important experiments, emergency trainings, and forecast model updates all being postponed. These new upgrades may now be postponed until 2020. NASA also suffered similarly. Reparations for the Hubble Space Telescope were compromised, and hundreds of staff were unable to attend and present their discoveries at the biggest U.S. astronomy conference. Other federally funded scientific endeavors suffered, with a plethora of experiments being ruined or set back significantly, such as cancer drug

trials.

Many Americans who rely on food stamps went hungry during the shutdown. Numerous government employees were either furloughed or worked without pay for the duration of the shutdown, making it difficult for them and their families to stay afloat. In total, delayed federal employee compensation totaled \$9.5 billion.

The partial government shutdown wreaked havoc on America. Worst of all, another government shutdown is possible if an agreement is not made by February 15<sup>th</sup>, 2019, which could cause yet more problems. Trump has also threatened to declare a national emergency if need be. It remains to be seen whether Trump and Congress can reach a compromise regarding the border wall and the federal budget.

## **Super Bowl LIII**

6:30 p.m. was the start time for kickoff at the Mercedes-Benz Stadium in Atlanta, Georgia. At that moment, Super Bowl LIII started to make its way to NFL history, becoming the lowest scoring title game. This game was the first Super Bowl to go into the fourth quarter without a single touchdown scored by either team. ## **Annual Grammy Awards: Highlights**

On February 10<sup>th</sup>, 2019, the 61<sup>st</sup> Annual Grammy awards were hosted by 15-time Grammy Award winner, Alicia Keys, at the Staples Center in Los Angeles, California. Camila Cabello opened the Grammys with a theatrical and elaborate performance of her hit song, "Havana". She was joined by Ricky Martin, Young Thug, Arturo Sandoval, and J Balvin in her playful rendition of her top song. J Balvin performed a bit of his smash hit "Mi Gente". After Cabello's performance, Alicia Keys invited some significant women on stage to speak about how music improved their lives. This group of women included Lady Gaga, Jada Pinkett Smith, Michelle Obama, and Jennifer Lopez.

Lady Gaga accepted the first award of the night for Best Pop Duo/Group Performance for "Shallow", her duet with Bradley Cooper from their hit film, A Star Is Born. In her acceptance speech, she went on to speak about mental health issues among fellow musical artists and other celebrities. Janelle Monáe performed her single "Make Me Feel", from her newest album, Dirty Computer. Monáe's performance radiated vibes similar to those of her mentor, Prince. Her performance had it all: guitar playing, fancy footwork, and her trademark black-and-white look.

Childish Gambino's "This is America" made history by winning Song of the Year. It was the first rap song to ever win this award. Presenters John Mayer and Alicia Keys had to accept the award for the controversial song on behalf of the rapper, since he did not attend the event. The Song of the Year award goes to the song's writers, rather than the artist. In addition to Song of the Year, it also took home Record of the Year. Once again, it made history by being the first rap song to win in that category. Post Malone performed his hit song, "Rockstar", without the featured rapper 21 Savage. Instead, he took the stage with the rock band Red Hot Chili Peppers. The song had earned 2 Grammy nominations.

A tribute to Dolly Parton was also featured in the show on Sunday night. Artists from all ages joined Parton to perform some of her top hits, including "Jolene" and "9 to 5". Chris Cornell won a Grammy for Best Rock Performance, almost two years after his death. Cornell's song "When Bad Does Good" received the award. The award for Best Rap Song was presented to Drake for "God's Plan". Producers cut Drake off midway through his speech for commercials!

The representation of women in this year's awards was much higher than in preceding years. Performance by performance, various female artists stole the show. Cardi B's performance was an example of one of the memorable performances at the ceremony. 15-time Grammy winner Alicia Keys did not fail to impress, playing two pianos at once and inviting the audience to "Club Keys". Lady Gaga slayed in her solo performance of "Shallow". The song is slow and mellow, but she performed an energetic rendition of the track.

Diana Ross's 75<sup>th</sup> birthday was celebrated at the Grammys with a heartfelt performance of "The Best Years of My Life" and "Reach Out and Touch (Somebody's Hand)". Her 9-year-old grandson, Raif-Henok Emmanuel Kendrick, who introduced her, stole the show with his cuteness.

Travis Scott went on to perform his hit "NO BYSTANDERS". His performance started out a bit mellow, singing another song with James Blake and Philip Bailey from Earth, Wind, and Fire. He then performed "NO BYSTANDERS" in a cage, surrounded by swarms of people. He crowd-surfed on stage during his performance. Jennifer Lopez lead the controversial Motown tribute,

joined by Smokey Robinson and Ne Yo.

"I grew up in Doylestown, PA where I attended Lenape and West. It's fantastic to be teaching at the district I went to!"


What was your favorite subject?

Is there anything else you would like Unami to know about you?


